

International Studies Major FAQs

1. How is international studies different from other internationally-oriented majors?

The international studies major is interdisciplinary. It requires cross-training in three disciplines – Economics, History, and Political Science and advanced study in a foreign language. International Studies majors do training at the 200- to 300-levels in all of these disciplines. This is the ideal major for someone who enjoys all four of these types of courses and wishes to gain intermediate-advanced skills in all of them. The goal of this cross-training is to be able to understand global problems in a multifaceted way.

2. Can I double-major or do a minor alongside International Studies?

Yes – getting a minor is very feasible, and double-majoring may be a possibility. It is typical for students to get a minor or another major in a discipline related to -oriented minors or an individualized minor, happy to meet with you to discuss options.

3. Is the International Studies major a good choice for students who wish to study abroad?

Yes. Many study abroad programs offer intermediate-advanced coursework in Economics, History, Political Science, and foreign languages, so meeting major requirements while abroad is very feasible.
